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# New Academic Staff

Our most crucial asset is our human capital, for it is people that lie at the heart of any good school or healthy community. She has over 20 years of teaching experience and possesses a Bachelor of Education (University of Sydney) and a Master's of Science Education (Macquarie University) where she was awarded a Vice Chancellor's Commendation for academic excellence. Mrs Bylsma is an innovative, dynamic and passionate educator who possesses the essential qualities to powerfully contribute to the development and promotion of vibrant, safe and supportive learning environment for students.

## Mrs Serena Lewis – Head of Teaching and Learning and Teacher: English

Mrs Lewis joins KWS as the Head of Teaching and Learning, and has vast experience as an educational leader and teacher in both the United Kingdom and Australia. Since emigrating to Australia in 2014, Mrs Lewis taught at Knox Grammar School and more recently at The King's School as the Literacy Coordinator K-12 where she was an inspiration to staff across all faculties. Mrs Lewis has a First Class Honours degree in English Literature and Psychology (BSc) and a Certificate in Education from Keele University, UK. In England, Mrs Lewis was Head of English and Languages and Chair of Teaching and Learning at Allertyree Woodlands School in Derbyshire. She has been an educational advisor to the school Principals and Heads in the UK and presenter at educational conferences in the area of Teaching and Learning.

## Mr Matthew Curran – Director of Boarding and Teacher: Mathematics

Mr Curran joins the KWS team as the Director of Boarding and also joins the Mathematics department. He has been working in the UK for the past 12 years and most recently has been Head of Boarding at Ardingly College, West Sussex in England where he led a dynamic and innovative co-educational boarding community of over 300 students. # 2017 HSC Results

Overall a pleasing set of results from last year's Year 12. Particularly pleasing to see the increase in the number of students achieving a Band 5 or better – and this has resulted in the median ATAR for the year group rise from 73 (achieved in 2016) to 77.

We have very strong performances in 18 subjects where they were well above the State average in the number of Band 5 & 6 achieved.

- Ten students achieved an ATAR over 95
- 20% students achieved an ATAR over 90
- Over 53% of all individual KWS subject results for the cohort were Band 5 or 6
- KWS students received 126 Band 6 results (including E4 in Extension subjects)
- KWS students received 468 Band 5 and 6 results (including E3 and E4 results) widely spread across subjects.

## Congratulations to:

**Amelia Rawson** received the Premier's All Rounder award with Band 6 scores in 10 or more units.

**Trent Russell** was acknowledged as a 2017 Top Achiever for placing 6th in the State in Software Design and Development.

**Rebekah Rae** achieved a perfect score of 50/50 in Music Extension.

Once again, our practical subjects achieved some excellent results resulting in many of our students receiving nominations to have their projects showcased as exemplars of the best work in the State.

**Visual Arts** - 3 Students had their major works nominated for the *ArtExpress* Exhibition, 2 were included in the exhibition.

**Drama** – 4 students had their group project was nominated for *OnSTAGE*.

**Music**– 3 students were nominated for inclusion in *Encore*.

**Design and Technology** – 1 student's design was nominated for *Shape 2017*.

**Textiles and Design** - 1 student's major project was nominated for *Shape 2017* and *Texstyle*.

**Industrial Technology** - 11 students were nominated for *InTech*.

Such achievements do not simply happen, they are a result of much dedicated work and perseverance – a commitment to giving their very best – by students and teachers and I congratulate all involved.

## Inter-House Swimming Carnival – Friday, 9<sup>th</sup> February

On Friday the Senior School will hold its annual Inter-House Swimming Carnival at the Orange Aquatic Centre. Parents are more than welcome to attend the event throughout the day. The carnival does create a slight variation to the normal daily routines. This information is as follows:

- 1) The School will provide bus transfers but in order to allow this to happen in a timely manner we ask all students who are able to go directly to the Orange Aquatic Centre.
- 2) Dress to and from carnival is sports uniform. House shirts should be worn on this day.
- 3) The carnival will run through to 4.00pm. Any students catching the early buses will need to be assembled in the kiosk by 3.15pm. This may mean that they will miss their butterfly trial but we cannot hold town bus services.
- 4) It is predicted to be hot on Friday – Please bring water bottles. Sunscreen will be supplied.

An impressive performance when you consider the size of the team.

Collette Lyons once again dominated every event she competed in (100 & 200 Breast, 200 Fly, 200 & 400 IM, 400 & 800 Free) swimming 7 events and winning 7 gold medals.

Gabby Shilling continued her impressive form in the backstroke events picking up a gold and a national age qualifying time in the 200 back and a bronze in the 100 back.

## Swimming: Senior State

The senior team have had a busy summer competing at State Age in late December, Emily Nobbs picking up a gold in the 200 Breast and a silver in the 100 Breast. Hugh Gillham mad the finals of the 100 and 200 fly coming 4th in the 100 and 6th in the 200. Oliver McLaughlin picked up silver in the 100 back.
